The highlight was probably having our Commemoration Service at Southwark Cathedral in March – this was the first time we had been in the same space together as a school since our service at the cathedral in March 2020. It felt very special to be reunited in a sacred space like the Cathedral, where we were able to reflect on what we had been through, and all that we have to come as a community. We were also able to have a Communion Service in school for Ash Wednesday shortly after this – it was wonderful to be able to mark the start of Lent in school by coming together in this way.

In the Autumn Term a small number of 6th formers participated in the Peace Education Programme from the Prem Rawat Foundation. The highlight of his visit was his contribution to our first ever in-depth conversation between an atheist and a priest. Here is a short reflection from our Year 12 hosts: "We were given the privilege to host a conversation between our Reverend Imogen and Humanist Didrik Sønderlind. We asked them questions about different topics written by our school community and based on our society and heard their opinions. We also opened the panel to the people in the audience, and their questions were absolutely fantastic! At first, we thought there would be a lot of contrasts between the two, but we ended up seeing that they do share a lot of the same values, the only major difference was their individual beliefs in God /a creator. It was interesting to learn about Didrick's own experience as a man that grew up with religion but eventually learnt and discovered new beliefs, the conversation allowed us to reflect on our own beliefs and ideas about the world and creator. Above all, it was a great opportunity, and we're very glad we were able to chair such an informative and insightful conversation.
