Our Progress 8 score for last years GCSE's was 0.75, well above the national average of -0.03 and the Southwark average of 0.37.

This is the highest in the **Southwark Diocesan family of secondary schools**, and fourth highest in Southwark local authority.

My congratulations again to those students (now in year 12) and to all the staff who worked so well together to achieve this great progress.

Drama Trips

On the 5th October our Year 13 Drama and Theatre A-Level class were lucky enough to be given free tickets to see 'untitled f**k m*ss s**gon play' at the Young Vic Theatre, Waterloo.

We were told to expect a performance that 'wriggles inside of and then explodes lifetimes of repeating Asian stereotypes, wrestling history for the right to control one's own narrative in a world that thinks it can tell you who you are.'

We found the show incredibly interesting, especially in the ways it reflected our devised performance in year 12 which focused on the stereotypes faced by women of colour.

The comedic elements and intimate atmosphere created by the narrator were a fascinating and original tool which enabled us to reflect on Asian stereotypes.

This means that across the UK multiple schools and youth companies will also be producing 'The Sad Club,' and professional directors will come to watch our performance before we transfer for one night at The Southwark Playhouse!

Auditions were held at the end of September. Nearly 100 students across years 7, 8, 9 and 10 auditioned and almost half were lucky to be cast.

The standard at the auditions (where students had to dance, sing and act) was high and everyone who auditioned should be proud of themselves.

Rehearsals have now begun and the show will take place in March!

This half term saw the celebration of Black History Month! This year's theme is 'Saluting our Sisters' and could not be more fitting for our school community.

A range of assemblies, activities, trips and special tutor discussions took place to acknowledge the countless black women and girls (past and present) who have inspired and continue to make remarkable contributions.

These induvial included Civil Rights activist Elizabeth Eckford, first black female entrepreneur and millionaire Mary Ellen, gold winning medallist athlete Dina Asher- Smith, well acclaimed author Afua Hirsh and many more.

Students were also given opportunities to discuss the importance of acknowledging and celebrating the everyday achievements of black women and girls.

One of the Black History Month activities involved the afterschool viewing of Dido Elizebeth Belle, Dido became a member of English upper-class and lived in Kenwood House in North London in the 18th century, this was attended by 30 students including Janelle in Year 7.

A Black Gaze Art Painting

Following on from the idea of returning the gaze, our Year 10 students have produced beautiful self-portrait prints staring confidently at the viewer.

To celebrate the start of Black History Month, Zarah (10B) has offered an insightful understanding of A Black Gaze:

The concept of 'A Black Gaze' is interpreted in many different ways. Some say it is the perspective, representation or portrayal of black individuals in the art world. However, others base it on the cultural significance of black identity in Art.

Despite the many ways it can be interpreted, I think it is the acknowledgement and celebration of our cultural heritage and personal experiences expressed in works of Art. In other words, what Black people have brought into the Art world.

I think this term is extremely important as it considers a more inclusive and accurate representation of the experiences of Black individuals by challenging stereotypes against them and helping others get a deeper understanding and meaning of Black culture, history and art.

However, the real question is how can this idea be shared when Black artists are constantly underrepresented? They have historically been neglected and undervalued as their work receives little recognition from art institutions, galleries and exhibitions. How long will it take the art world to realize how much prodigious works of Art they are giving up?



Lagos Peckham Trip

On the 11th October, twenty year 11 students attended an art exhibition at South London Gallery, Peckham called 'Lagos, Peckham, Repeat: Pilgrimage to the Lakes.'

It was an amazing way to educate ourselves on the topic of being black British. It was the perfect opportunity to further explore Nigerian culture through the lens of modern art, exercising our personal knowledge of links between Lagos and Peckham as a channel through which to address wider issues of migration.

Peckham is home to one of the largest Nigerian communities in the UK. The exhibition brings together thirteen contemporary Nigeria and British-Nigerian artists to explore issues of migration, differences in culture and sense of belonging.

At the centre of the exhibition, is a look at the nuances of changing ideas about identity and home as generations of Nigerians progress that have settled in London. Each piece of artwork originates from various standpoints regarding the artists own relationship with their background.

This exhibition was unforgettable, it was truly an experience everything about this exhibition was curated perfectly to ensure that the people attending really had an experience when visiting, I recommend everyone to attend as it is free, and it is a chance to envelope yourself in art and history.

Catherine presented her latest published novels to the students "Race to the Frozen North" and "Freedom." Despite the fact that her characters are fictional, Catherine assured her audience that they are always based on real historical events.

Catherine talked about historical figures who had influenced her work and delighted the students with the real historical facts she had used for her novels.

Even Alexandre Dumas' father, who held the highest black military position in French history, makes a brief appearance in the "Blade and Bone" novel.

The girls had an opportunity to interact with Catherine after the Q&A session and expressed their gratitude and delight for their visit and getting her autograph.

Confirmation Service

This is an advance notice to say that we are hoping to hold a Confirmation Service in school at the end of the Spring term 2024.

Anyone in the school community with a Christian faith is welcome to be confirmed at this service.

You may be wondering exactly what Confirmation is? Confirmation is a way for Christians to publicly commit themselves to living as a Christian – it is literally about standing up and saying "I have decided to live as a Christian" in front of family and friends.

For many people, this can be a powerful experience. Confirmation in the Anglican Church came about because people are often baptised as babies – this is a way of saying that the baby has become a Christian.

However, as babies can't make that choice for themselves, when they grow up, they may decide that they want to 'confirm' the choice that was made by their parents at their baptism, by saying 'Yes, I do want to live as a Christian.'

Although our Confirmation service will be an Anglican one, people of any Christian denominations are welcome to participate. If people haven't yet been baptised, it is possible to be baptised and confirmed in this service.

We are hoping that the Confirmation will take place after school one evening in the Chapel in late March, and will be attended by the families and friends of those being confirmed. It should be a lovely occasion.

Confirmation preparation sessions will start soon after Christmas, so please let me know if you are interested.
