Sheriff Challenge Trip

Our extraordinary team of four talented year 12 economics students took part in the 'Sheriff Challenge' competition on the 6th March, at the Central Criminal Court of England and Wales, commonly referred to as the Old Bailey.

The students prepared a compelling 8-minute speech answering the question:

'Should the City of London do more to improve learning and career opportunities for those from less privileged backgrounds?'

The speech was organised, eloquent and powerful. The judges were particularly impressed by the team's confident use of stylish language, their strong subject knowledge, their excellent depth and range of material, their constant use of effective body language and the links they were able to build with their audience for impact.

The judges were so impressed by our year 12 students that they have been offered potential work experience at the Old Bailey this summer term.

Helpers House Network

On the 22nd March, Blessing Olorundare, St Saviour's & St Olave's Alumnus and founder of Helpers House Network. Helpers House Network is a community interest company that aims to educate and support aspiring midwives.

Through her platform we provide schools and university students with resources, workshops and programs to aid them in their journey to become midwives.

We invited our Year 12's Health and Social Care students and our Year 11's who were keen to hear more.

Blessing, graciously shared her firsthand experiences of learning and practising midwifery. We gained valuable insights into the rigorous path to entering the midwifery field, which requires hard work and dedication.

Blessing shared her journey to her current achievements, highlighting the role her GCSE results and A-Level subjects played, especially psychology and health and social care. She described the connection between BTEC health and social care, emphasizing how it has improved her university experience, through challenging yet rewarding units like Anatomy and Physiology.

During the session, Blessing openly expressed her frustrations with the lack of resources available to students and aspiring midwives. Inspired to make a difference, she acted by founding the Helpers House Network Group.

This initiative provides a supportive platform for young people like Blessing to connect with others on similar journeys, whether it's selecting universities or completing their final year of study.

Blessing also distributed informative leaflets detailing her campaign, providing additional insights into her cause. Additionally, she shared her Instagram account, where she offers a plethora of valuable resources including links to her e-books, revision materials, and engaging quizzes featured on her Instagram stories.

After the talk, some students expressed an interest in learning more about Blessing's initiative.

"I felt that Blessing's talk has truly allowed me to believe that there will be support and guidance available beyond school when I eventually apply for apprenticeships or universities." Similarly, a Year 11 student said that, "Blessing has encouraged me to rethink my choices for both my A-Level subjects and future undergraduate degree."

The students who were given the opportunity were Andrea (12D), Christabel (12S), Shanda (12S).

"We all visited the city together to view MYO, an office rental site. The year 12 students were accompanied by a smaller group of year 12 students from Harris Bermondsey. During a conference-style workshop, the students developed transferable skills by identifying their areas of interest in the workforce and how to use them.

The purpose of the programme was to inspire women to pursue careers in construction during Independence Month.

A tour of the building was also provided to the year 12 class so they could observe the various aspects of the location that lets other companies rent office space.

Once the conference ended, the year 12 students had the opportunity to meet some incredible women from the company who shared their experiences about how they got into construction, inspiring the younger generation to pursue a career in the same field."

They also advised on how to succeed in a male-dominated industry.







EPR Architects

Construction Youth are one of our school partners, the programme is aimed at Key Stage 5 students who are interested in exploring their post Sixth Form options. Its focus is on careers in the Built-Environment Sector. Our students can have support with degree-level apprenticeships in a range of industries including architecture, engineering, project management and quantity surveying.

The final part of the programme, students were able to visit ERP Architects who are now our school partners for a mock assessment day working with staff members from EPR.

PSHCE Workshop

Year 13 participated in important research on the 21st March. Led by Dr. Gemma Knowles, Lecturer at King's College London and Research Fellow at the KCL Centre for Society and Mental Health.

Students responded to data sets and answered the following critical questions:

Why do lifelong sex, gender inequalities in mental health emerge at the age they do (late childhood)? What are the causes/mechanisms, from the biological to the social and their dynamic interplay? Are they preventable? If so, how?

Gemma said that our students have provided invaluable primary research that will help to shape the focus of the Bridging Divides research project.

Well done, Year 13! You should feel empowered to stand up for and speak out about this hugely important topic.

The most useful part of the week was when visitors led focus groups where they talked about their own personal experiences of growing up as part of the LGBT community. They talked about the challenges they faced at school and at home and where they had been able to find support.

It gave us all a chance to reflect on how times are changing and how lucky we are to be in a school that is supportive of all its students.



On 25th March we were very pleased to welcome the Archdeacon of Southwark, Ven. Jonathan Sedgwick who came to speak at our whole school assembly, and then to give the gift of a Bible to each Year 7 student, generously provided by our Governors.

It was lovely to have Archdeacon Jonathan back in school as he is the former Rector of our next-door parish, St George the Martyr, at Borough, and has previously served on our Governors.

As we were entering Holy Week, in our assembly Archdeacon Jonathan took us through the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on a donkey on Palm Sunday, through to the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, then Jesus' arrest, trial and death on Good Friday.

He finished by reminding us that this is not the end of the story...that Jesus' life doesn't end in disappointment, but in the possibility of new life and a new start. It was important to be reminded of the positivity of this story and how we can apply these themes to our own lives.

As the Year 7's received their Bibles, Archdeacon Jonathan asked them to find Psalm 139:14 which said, "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well."

He spoke about how this verse can always remind us of our value and worth.

We hope that the Bibles will be a keepsake of the student's time at St Saviour's & St Olave's, whether it is a resource for personal faith and life, or for their academic study of Religious Studies.

We are very grateful to the Governor's for providing this and for supporting our Christian ethos at St Saviour's & St Olave's.

Ralph Fiennes Visit

On the 19th March, famous Hollywood and Shakespearean actor, Ralph Fiennes, came to St Saviour's & St Olave's to deliver a workshop to some very lucky students.

The students from Year 10 to 13 either performed in the Little Shop of Horrors, whole school production last year, or performed in this year's Sad Club production.

This was a fantastic opportunity to receive acting tips from an award warning actor.

It was truly an unforgettable experience for students, and staff! Below are some experiences from the students who took part:

"As a drama student and someone who also participated in Sad Club I got the opportunity, along with others, to participate in a workshop with Ralph Fiennes who played Voldemort in Harry Potter, Heathcliff in Wuthering Heights and many more roles along with awards.

He taught us how to interpret the play 'Macbeth' and how to perform certain lines; he not only gave us an idea of how powerful these lines are when performing them but a deeper meaning of what Shakespeare writes about.

This workshop was an amazing experience to work with someone so known in the industry."

"This workshop was truly a privilege. Working with such a renowned actor Ralph Fiennes and his team gave me the ability to explore deeper in drama and acting and the power of literature. The workshop exposed me to the power of words, how to be confident and passionate in speaking in front of a crowd, but also how to have creativity within yourself to bring insight and concepts to ideas. It was very enjoyable and inspiring."

"The workshop helped me to view Macbeth from the perspective I was familiar with. Analysing a Shakespearean play outside of just simply reading the script in an English lesson and instead having his conflict and turmoil, expressed through his soliloquy, verbalised allowed me to understand Macbeth as the complex character that Shakespeare intended him to be.

Being separated from how Shakespeare used literary techniques to shape meaning and shifted into how characters communicate emotions to the audience through their voice and body language, humanised Macbeth to me and allowed me to almost feel some sort of sympathy for him despite him trying to justify murder."

The way he spoke and delivered the soliloquy was empowering; particularly as a GCSE Drama student. It inspired me and showed me new ways of reading and showing emotions, passion and understanding through the way I speak and how I use tone to express my thoughts. It left me in awe and admiration. I think my favourite part of the day was after the workshop, I stayed behind, took out my copy of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone and got it signed... by Voldemort himself. "Not only as a passionate English student, but also as a person whom loves Drama and is taking it for GCSEs I thought that the opportunity to meet Ralph Fiennes, and Lola, one of the witches in the show was an interesting an eye-opening experience."



The theme was enhanced by the logos of each partner organisation being taken to the front of the cathedral to create a display, surrounding a collage of photographs of our students involved in activities made possible by each partner.
