School Uniform

In a process which began before the onset of the pandemic, the governors have been reviewing various aspects of the school's uniform. We are very grateful to those of you who contributed to the consultation which was undertaken.

Having considered the various responses, and following discussions of their own, governors have agreed the following changes to the St Saviour's school uniform for students in Years 7 - 11:

- Trousers: navy trousers may be worn as an alternative to a skirt
- Hijab: a navy hijab will be introduced for those who wish to wear it

<u>These changes will become effective from the start of term in</u> <u>January 2022</u>. Before that, there will be some important discussion with the newly-elected members of the School Council to discuss certain aspects, particularly the styling of the trousers. Our Black History Month Trip to the Coliseum

Tuesday 12th October 2021

Today I had the privilege of going on a trip organised by Mr Gilder to watch an opera for the first time.

It's called Satyagraha and it is based on Philip Glass's meditation on Gandhi's early years in South Africa and the progress of his concept of non-violent protest as a positive force for change.

We started off by having a discussion about Gandhi's early life during his twenties when he believed that there was a hierarchy in terms of race, however this belief soon dissipated as he got older and wiser. The opera was mesmerising and the links between the music and the acting was very clear, extravagant and minimal at the same time. For example, when there was violence the singers and actors would portray that through stronger and sharper movements and the orchestra would also add onto that by speeding the music up or getting louder with a crescendo and then quieter to show the end of the war or solemnity with a diminuendo.

Despite the singing being in Sanskrit I could still understand what was going in the story through the excellent presentation and music. I had a really good time and I can't wait to go again!

Summer Term Catch-up #1: Gamelan Gift from Indonesia



On 21st June we celebrated International Music Day with a Gamelan workshop for some of our year 7 students (now in Year 8 of course), kindly funded by the Embassy of the Republic of Indonesia to the United Kingdom.

Students learned about the music of Indonesia, and Javanese gamelan in particular, and were all able to try each of the instruments of the Southwark Music Service gamelan orchestra which is housed at St Saviour's and St Olave's School.

The day was led by local gamelan musician Aris Daryono, and we were honoured to host the Indonesian education and cultural attaché in the Indonesia embassy, Dr Mohammed Arif Rokhman, who brought some gifts for the students participating and spoke to our students about his role.
