Psychology Student Interest Day

On Wednesday 23rd November, Ms Brooke and Mrs Adeneye took a group of Year 12 and 13 Social Sciences students to Conway Hall for a Psychology Student Interest Day hosted by Hodder.

The students got to experience University style lectures about the latest academic research delivered by leading experts in their fields. This gave the students an opportunity to understand what a career in Psychology could look like and the fascinating paths that it can take.

The students were also taught about the science and psychology of revision, allowing them to review and learn revision techniques that are evidence based to prepare for their A Level Examinations.

Girls on Track Event

10 year 7 students were invited to take part in a 'Girls on Track' event, organised by Motorsport UK. At this event, they met some of UCL's female engineering students, took part in a 'Pitstop challenge' (taking the tyres off a model race car in the fastest time possible), built and coded Lego cars, worked with a motorsport presenter, tested out their reaction times on a Batak wall and built and raced a cardboard model car on a gas-powered track. In addition, they were given a crash course in CPR from a real F1 medic – did you know that the best tune to do CPR to is Baby Shark?!

Finally, students also got to see a prototype racecar and sit in the driver's seat, just like an F1 driver (Pictured below Asya).

St Saviours & St Olaves students also scooped up some prizes on the day - Jahri-Ann won the Batak challenge, with 37 hits in 30 seconds, while Brume made the most efficient car to race on the air-track.

Both won some very stylish baseball. Nayla and Jahri-Ann were also interviewed by the organisers, who said that their interview might be seen by Lewis Hamilton!

World Philosophy Day

World Philosophy Day this year had an emphasis on the topics of Aesthetics, Religion and Responsibility. It involved a Philosophy quiz in the library in which the students could use the internet to answer questions about the greatest Philosophical thinkers and thoughts. The high number of entries that achieved 100% in the quiz, we then picked 5 lucky winners to receive a prize.

Our celebrations also included a Philosophy of Art gallery, to introduce students to new ways of analysing art and the deeper meaning behind them.

Artwork included 'Magnetism' by Ahmed Mater – for which students commented on the symbolism of how religion and science can repel one another. Students were mesmerised by the intricate detail of sound and visuals of 'Transfiguration' by Universal Everything – a continuous video displaying the cycle of natural materials metamorphosing into one another with sharp and glittering sounds accompanying the figure moving across the screen.

We also talked about how we can define art, whether it is the beauty of it or whether it is the skill. We then examined art pieces that lacked both beauty and skill, and students thought even deeper about the real defining features of art.

Those who wanted to discuss these questions further entered a World Philosophy Essay competition. We opened the competition up to all year groups and had a multitude of wonderful essays from students in KS3 and KS4. Congratulations to our winner of KS3, Patricia in Year 7, for her wonderful analytic essay discussing one of the biggest questions of moral philosophy: ought we to always follow the greater number?

Patricia provided fantastic, personal scenarios which perfectly illustrated her arguments for and against the belief that we should always do what the greater number of people want to do. Well done Patricia. Congratulations to our 2nd and 3rd place winners: Seray in Year 9 and Brume in Year 7 for their excellent essays on human rights and whether art has to be beautiful in order to be considered art.

For KS4, congratulations to our 2nd and 3rd place winners: Zarin in Year 10 for her convincing argument on why criminals ought to have human rights, and Daniella in Year 11 for her aesthetics essay on why "beauty, just like opinions, will always be relative."

Finally, big congratulations to our KS4 winner, Angela in Year 10 for her fantastic essay on whether art needs to be beautiful in order to be considered 'art'. Angela's wonderful writing style complemented her arguments perfectly. She refers to numerous world-famous philosophical thinkers throughout the course of history, for example writing:

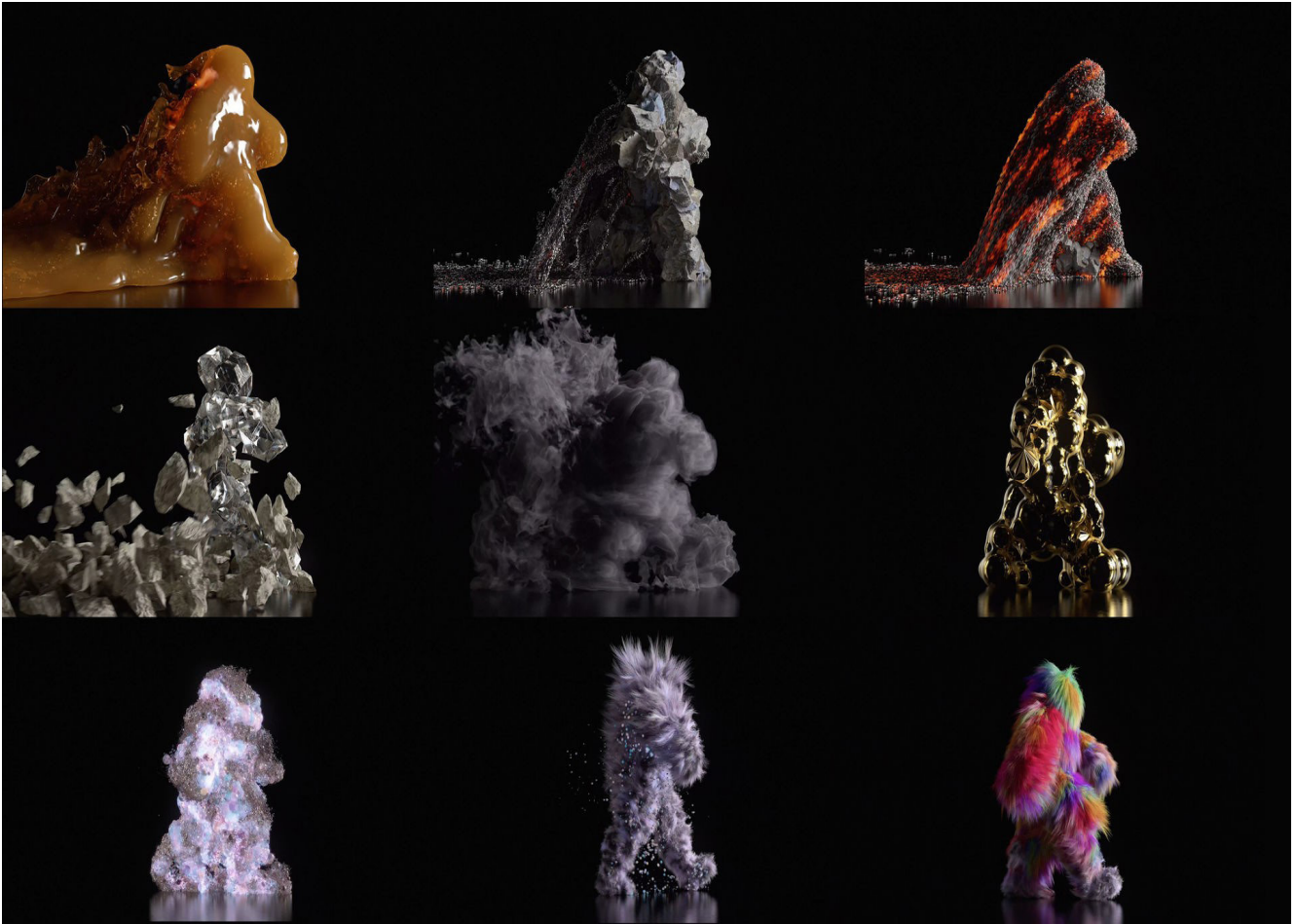
"Greek philosophers believed that beauty was primarily an objective quality that resided in the thing itself rather than the reaction of the viewer. According to Plato, the realm of form is where beauty exists, and an object might be deemed beautiful if it fits into one of those forms.

Similar reasoning may be found in Aristotle's 'Poetics', which stated that "to be beautiful, a living creature, and every whole made up of parts must... present a certain order in its arrangement of parts."

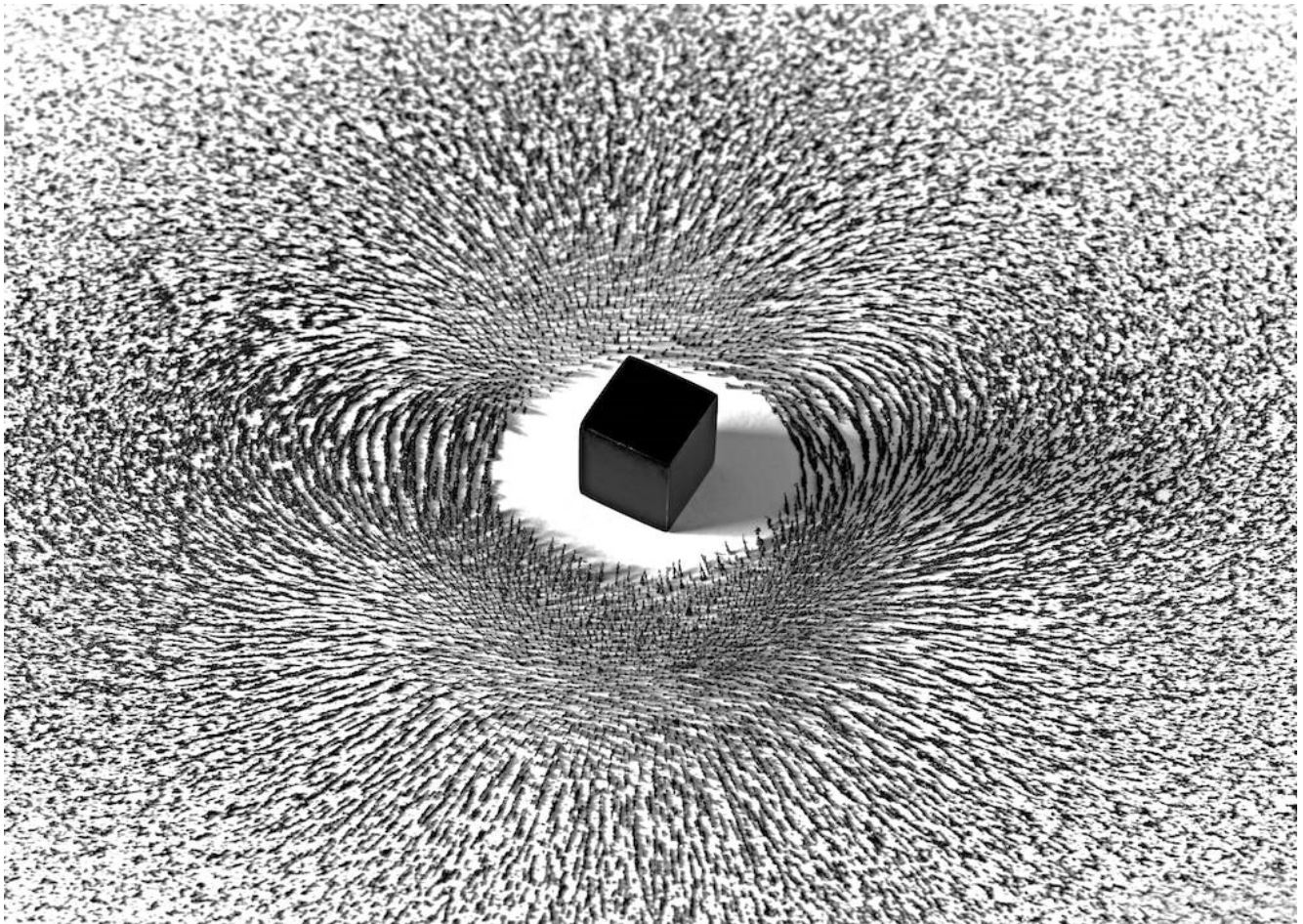
Thank you and well done to all of the students that took part in World Philosophy Day. Many interesting questions were raised, even more interesting answers given and many house points and prizes awarded!

Girl Code Workshop

Our Year 9 students took part in a 4-part workshop to provide a functional and kinaesthetic introduction to STEM for young women. To encourage them to break into the stereotypically male dominated field and realise their professional potential as a future generation of coders.

The workshop's objective was for students to code their very own calculator application and put it on the internet. The course went through basic simple programming concepts via web development, which is the most visual part to coding and the easiest to understand.

At the end of the workshops, students were able to code and style a website, view their running code, break down problems into smaller problems and discover the different elements there are to coding.

It's no secret that the tech and STEM sectors are in desperate need of women. With the hope of inspiring the women of tomorrow, the Mathematics and Computer Science department at St Saviour's and St Olave's provided an opportunity for our Year 9 students to work with a Lead Application Developer.

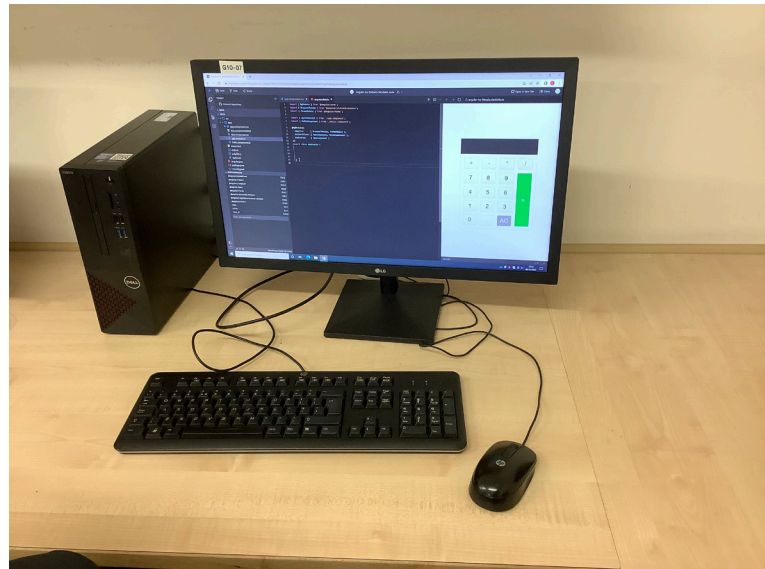
"I really enjoyed the Coding classes as it gave me an insight on girls and women in Coding but also the jobs that are available in coding and computer science.

Almodóvar is an internationally celebrated Spanish film director who is known for his unique techniques in his films. During the trip students learned about the film frames used, camera angles selected and the significant use of the colour red (which is a reoccurring colour in many of his films).

Elsie bravely took the microphone and, in front of hundreds of other A level Spanish students, described how the director creates strong female characters which reflect on his upbringing in rural Spain.

The students also compared the film's poster to one of Sara Montiel, an actress whose work Almodóvar greatly admired. These points demonstrated the students' in-depth knowledge of the director and showed off how confident they have become when speaking Spanish ¡Muy bien!

Kinship Hub

In the run up to Christmas we wanted to write to you to let you know what we're doing year round here at Kinship Hub to help support Kinship Carers in these increasingly difficult financial times. The cornerstone of our work has always been helping make healthy food accessible for Kinship families, and so we're constantly looking for ways to increase our ability to offer more practical help- like with access to some free groceries!

In light of the nationwide increase in cost of living, we've continued to expand our partnerships with other London organisations, such as Getir, to increase our access to donated food items to help give Kinship families a way to reduce their weekly food bills while still being able to have access to healthy, nutritious foods.

We continue to run our weekly Kinship Carers Cooking Club each Saturday. We meet in person the first Saturday of the month in SE23, with the rest of the Saturday sessions being offered virtually via zoom calls. It's an opportunity for carers and children to come together, cook a healthy meal, develop friendships, access peer support, and have fun with other children in similar living situations.

To help support this project better, we've hired two Saturday delivery drivers which allows us to more easily deliver grocery parcels of the ingredients needed (and often other donated food items) to kinship families in the South London area. We're confident now that we are able to reach all interested Kinship families living in Southwark, Lewisham, Lambeth, Wandsworth, Greenwich and Bromley boroughs.

If you know of Kinship Families in South London that would benefit from becoming a member of our cooking club, please share the above flyer with them.

Our referral criteria continues to include all Kinship families, regardless of there being a legal order in place or not.
